Congratulations to Registered Nurse
Debbie Osborne who recently
celebrated 20 years at Mount
Edgcumbe Hospice. She's pictured
here with some of her colleagues and
writes; "I came to the hospice from the
Acute Trust and was so delighted
when I was offered a position. The
decision to move jobs came out of the
desire to provide really good end of
life care, which was sadly not always
possible to achieve on a 28 bedded
ward within an acute setting.



I remember driving into the hospice grounds and immediately feeling a sense of peace, something that our patients and relatives feel today. In those early days, before the shift started, the team would visit each patient in turn and offer a prayer or a daily affirmation, I had never experienced anything like this before in my nursing career. As a patient approached end of life there would always be somebody to sit with them, a nurse or a volunteer, sadly a luxury that the hospital was rarely able to provide and not for the want of trying.

During my time at the hospice I have learnt so much and this knowledge and insight has enabled me to enhance the care of so many extraordinary people that I have nursed at Mount Edgcumbe, but also members of my own family at the end of their lives when care had been somewhat questionable.

I have enjoyed the past 20 years of my nursing career and am so pleased to have seen it through at the hospice and hope to continue for a while longer."

#### **NEW BEREAVEMENT HELP POINT**

The Community Services team launched a new Bereavement Help Point on Monday 9th September at Ladock Community Hall. The morning session was well attended with some who were new to our services, as well as some who had joined us on one of the Walk Talk Kernow events. Community Engagement Officer Clare Bray tells us more;



Bereavement Help Points are a drop in space for anyone who has been bereaved to come for support and signposting in a friendly and welcoming environment. The two-hour sessions allow people to chat with others in a similar situation, make connections and get some support over a cup of tea or coffee. All sessions are free of charge and there is no need to book. It was really lovely to be at the first Ladock help point, and to get to meet and chat to those who came along.

There is always a very supportive atmosphere at these sessions, and we look forward to getting to know more people over the coming months. If it helps to bring a friend with you when you come to any of the Help Points, we look forward to meeting them as well.

The new Bereavement Help Point will be in Ladock every month, on the second Monday, from 10am – 12pm and we look forward to welcoming more people. Ladock now forms part of 4 monthly help points across Cornwall including at Mount Edgcumbe Hospice, Treverbyn, Redruth Hub and St Julia's Hospice. #### A DELICIOUS DELIVERY




